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UN Told To Continue Campaign Against Apartheid


The UN Assembly's Special Political Committee in New York, continuing its debate on the apartheid policies of the South African Govern-

ment, was told by Turkey on 7th November that efforts against apartheid should be continued on three fronts — pressure of world opinion should be increased by intensifying the campaign against apartheid, efforts should be made to achieve greater unity in the political field in order to translate previous resolutions into effective action, and moral and material support for the victims of apartheid should be strengthened. Finland told the Committee, that it did not share the view

The UNFICYP Commander, Lt. Gen. A.E. Martola, pinned the medals on a representative number of the contingent after emphasising in his speech the vital role which UNCIVPOL plays in the Cyprus problem.

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that the United Nations had failed to advance the struggle against apartheid.

Information provided largely through the United Nations, the Finnish Representative said, had made apartheid "frighteningly real" even to those far away, and as a consequence an important shift in the international opinion had taken place.

Today virtually all states were prepared to apply to the question of the apartheid principle, that nations must be responsible to the international community for their action, when these actions caused substantial international effect.

UNESCO Awards Kalinga Prize To British Scientist

The 1,000 dollar Kalinga Prize for the popularization of science, awarded each year by an international jury chosen by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) goes this year to Sir Gavin de Beer of the United Kingdom.

Sir Gavin de Beer's candidature for the prize was put forward by the Academy of Sciences of the Institute of France. Sir Gavin is both a scientist and a popularizer of science. His research has covered zoology and biology, his writings have ranged from Charles Darwin to Voltaire and Shelley.

International "Machinery" To Control Use Of Seabeds

As two new proposals relating to the world's seabeds were put before the UN General Assembly's main political committee, on Friday 7 Nov., seventeen of less developed states asked the Secretary General to study what kind of an international "machinery" could be set up to control the uses of seabeds for the benefit of mankind as a whole.

The draft of the seventeen states indicates, that the interests of the landlocked states should not yield to those of coastal nations, and says that special attention should be given to the needs of poorer nations.

At the same time Uruguay submitted a draft resolution


asking states not to claim any part of the ocean floors beyond the limits of the present national jurisdiction, while an international agreement on their use was being worked out. The draft also says that nothing being done on the




DCOS Visits The Anglians

(Continued from Page 1) seafloors beyond national limits — such as oil extraction — justifies making such claims.

Proposals already before the Committee include a Belgian draft asking the standing Seabed Committee to continue its work on legal principles and a code of exploitation.

A Maltese resolution looks toward an international conference dealing with the continental shelf and an international regime for the ocean floors.

ALGERIAN FLOOD VICTIMS GET WFP AID

The World Food Programme (WFP) is sending emergency food aid valued at 1.4 million dollars to Algeria to help prevent mass starvation among victims of "unprecedented" rain-floods.

A series of cloudbursts early last month resulted in four to six times the annual rainfall over three of the five affected Departments.

Interim reports from WFP officials visiting the areas tell of an 80 per cent loss of the country's date crop besides all food grown under the date palms. The rains also threaten a complete loss of most palms, which would deny Algeria a considerable part of its date crop for three to four years.

The allocation for feeding 180,000 persons for three months, including costs of shipping, was authorized by Adelko H. Boerma, Director-General of the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO).







The Fanfare Trumpets Of The Pompadours


