
UNFICYP VOLUNTEERS ANSWER CALL FOR BLOOD DONATIONS

SECRETARY - GENERAL RETURNS TO NEW YORK FROM EUROPE

U Thant, United Nations Secretary-General, returned to New York from Europe on Friday evening following a meeting in Paris with Mai Van Bo, Delegate General of the Popular Republic of Viet-Nam. The talks lasted an hour and 20 minutes.

The Secretary-General declined to comment on the talks he had with the North Vietnamese representative except to state that the atmosphere was cordial.

U Thant decided to stop over in Paris at the end of a trip which had taken him to Geneva and the BENELUX countries — Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg.

U Thant Again Calls For New Contributions To Help Meet Costs Of UN Force in Cyprus

UN Secretary-General U Thant has again called for voluntary contributions from Governments to help meet the operation costs of the United Nations Force in Cyprus.

In a letter to all Member States of the United Nations and its specialised agencies, he noted that over five and a half million dollars were needed to cover the current three-month mandate of the 4,700-man Force. However, he said because of the "chronic and growing" deficit, an additional four million dollars was

needed if the UN is to honour past commitments to nations furnishing troops to the Force.

U Thant recalled his warning last month that if the financial deficit were not met this may bring about the premature withdrawal of United Nations units. The Force has been in Cyprus since March 1964.

When the UN Security Council met in New York in March and agreed on the most recent extension of the Force's stay — until 26 June — it expressed the hope that progress toward a Cypriot settlement during the current period would enable the troops to be cut or withdrawn entirely.

U Thant said that the total cost of the peace-keeping operation from March 1964 to June 1968 was about 90 million dollars.

The Force is financed on a voluntary basis. The major contributor has been the United States, with close to half of the 80 million dollars so far received. Forty-nine other nations have also made contributions.

New Contribution By Denmark To UNFICYP Costs

Denmark has informed the United Nations that it will make a further contribution of 60,000 dollars to help meet the operation of the United Nations Force in Cyprus.

In a letter dated 5 April to the UN Secretary-General, U Thant, the Permanent Representative of Denmark to the United Nations, Mr. Otto R. Borch, said that the new contribution by Denmark was being made to meet the costs of the period ending 26 March 1968.

In the course of his trip, U Thant attended the laying of a foundation-stone of the new wing of the UN Office in Geneva and met with Government leaders in the BENELUX countries.

At The Hague, he also met with the President and Judges of the International Court of Justice at the Peace Palace.



Major Rideland är 36 år gammal och på de åren har han hunnit avverka det mesta av världen. Bördig från Lingbo och Kilafors i Hälsingland har han upplevt så avlägsna delar av jordklotet som Nya Guinea och norra Salomonöarna, där han under åren 1958-63 tjänstgjorde som Patrol Officer i den australiska distriktadministrationens tjänst. Han har därutöver företagit två omfattande resor för Sveriges Radio-TV:s räkning till Sydostasien och Söderhavsoarna Samoa, Tonga, Tahiti och Fiji. I tre år var han anställd på utlandsavdelningen inom Sveriges Radio-TV och har ett stort antal program i båda medierna på sitt samvete. Hans utlandserfarenheter omfattar vidare reportageresor i Afrika och Sydamerika. Om sina många gånger häpnadsväckande eskapader i fjärran och ännu utforskade länder har Finn Rideland skrivit fyra böcker och utger i höst den femte. 



Korkealla paistava aurinko, pilvetön taivas, kauempana näkyvä vuorijono, muonankuljetuslantikan odotus, kananmunien paistelua, kahvin keittelyä, kolme tuntia vartiovuoroa, yhdeksän tai kaksitoista tuntia vapaata, kebablauma, Cinderella Rockefeller ja transistoriradio, PU autoineen kolmesti päivässä, auringonotto, erilaiset pelit, jo nyt melkoista kuumuutta hehkuva maaperä. Siinä puitteet, joissa pataljoonan ulommilla vartiopaikoilla eli Vahdeilla työskentelevät vartiomiehet joutuvat olemaan. Kolmen tunnin kuluttua tulee toinen mies tilalle, edellinen on äkkiä uimahoususillaan ja alkaa kärventää nahkaansa keväisessä, melko polttavassa auringonpaisteessa. Matkaradio soi. Kauempana paimen huutelee lampaille. Joku kavereista nukkuu viileässä teltassa, toinen pelailee pasianssia ja yrittää saada läpi. Tulisi sen muonalantikan mukana nyt jäit.

CANADA'S LIBERALS NAME TRUDEAU PRIME MINISTER

The Liberal Party supporters serving with the Canadian Contingent of the United Nations Force in Cyprus have sent the following to the editors of THE BLUE BERET. It is being published as a nonpartisan bit of news of general interest to Force readers.

Following the Liberal leadership convention in Ottawa in April 1968, the Honourable Pierre Elliott Trudeau became Prime Minister designate of Canada.

Mr. Trudeau was born in Montreal on 28 October 1921, the son of Mr. Charles Emile Trudeau and Miss Grace Elliott, both Canadian citizens. He was educated at Jean-de-Brebeuf College, the University of Montreal, Harvard University, Université de Paris and London School of Economics. He is a lawyer and professor of law and a member of the Royal Society of Canada and Quebec Bar.

He was first elected to the House of Commons in 1965 and appointed Parliamentary Secretary to the Prime Minister, Mr. Lester B. Pearson, in January 1966. He became Minister of Justice in early 1967.

Mr. Trudeau will become Prime Minister of Canada approximately at the end of the current month. His home is in Montreal.

DANCON Soldier Killed in Speed Boat Crash

A soldier of the Danish Contingent serving with the United Nations Force in Cyprus was killed in a collision between two speedboats which occurred Sunday afternoon off the coast of Famagusta.

The soldier, Private First Class Ole Busk Soerensen, 21, of Vilstrup, PR, Taulov, Denmark, was in one of the two boats that collided.

Pte Soerensen had been serving with the Danish Contingent in Cyprus since November 1967. His body was brought to Nicosia and is being flown to Denmark this week for burial in his native country.

UN Emergency Food Aid For Jordan, Syria, UAR

Emergency food aid, originally sanctioned for six months to help feed victims of last June's hostilities in Jordan, Syria and the United Arab Republic, has been ex-

tended for another two months, in view of the continuing hardship of the victims.

The additional allocation of 1.6 million dollars from the resources of the World Food Programme (WFP) was approved on 9 April by Mr. A.H. Boerma, Director-General of the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO). It raises the total of emergency aid for the Near East to 5 million dollars over an eight-month period. It covers 150,000 displaced persons in Jordan, 100,000 in Syria and 35,000 in the United Arab Republic.

SUGAR CONFERENCE OPENS AT UN PALAIS IN GENEVA

The United Nations Sugar Conference will be open at the Palais des Nations, Geneva, today Wednesday, 17 April, for the purpose of negotiating a new comprehensive sugar agreement.

The Conference has been called by the Secretary-General of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD), Dr. Raul Prebisch, to find means of providing a mechanism that would bring with it better prices and increased stability in the world sugar market.

UN General Assembly To Resume Session In New York Next Week

The 123 Member States of the United Nations have been notified formally that the XXII General Assembly, in recess since December, will be resumed at United Nations Headquarters in New York on 24 April.

South West Africa Council Fails To Enter Territory

The UN Council on South West Africa announced in Zambia late last week that it had not been able to charter an aircraft for a flight to the Territory because of the opposition of the South African authorities in control.

In a statement issued in Zambia, the Council declared however that it would pursue its efforts to enter South West Africa, an old League of Nations mandated Territory for which the United Nations asserted its direct responsibility in 1966.

Meanwhile, the Council said, it would go to Tanzania to meet with South West African figures residing there.

The Council was set up a year ago to take over the administration of South West Africa and prepare it for speedy independence.

South Africa, which contends that the UN has no jurisdiction, has refused to let it in.

The Council had been meeting last week in Lusaka, Zambia, to hear representatives of South West African independence movements.

Reorganization of UN Secretariat Weighed

The UN Secretary-General, U Thant, has appointed a small team of experts to consider the problem of reorganization of the UN Secretariat and to make appropriate recommendations to him.

A seven-member Committee has been appointed by the Secretary-General on a wide geographical distribution basis which will enable him to secure the assistance and advice of people of recognised competence from the various parts of the world.

When the session was suspended last December, the issue of non-proliferation of nuclear weapons, the Middle East situation and the question of South West Africa were left open for further consideration.

Since then, the Geneva Disarmament Conference has submitted a report containing a draft treaty on the non-proliferation of nuclear arms based on a text jointly submitted by the United States and the Soviet Union and subsequently revised to incorporate changes proposed by other Member States.

The report also contains a draft resolution in which the United States, the Soviet Union and Great Britain have undertaken to sponsor in the UN Security Council a resolution designed to give assurances — through the Council — against the threat or use of nuclear weapons against any State denying itself the possession of such weapons under the proposed treaty.

Seminar Submits Measures to Check "Brain Drain"

Measures to help stem the "brain drain" of scientists from the developing countries to the more advanced ones came under discussion at a weekend seminar held at UN Headquarters in New York under the auspices of the UN Advisory Committee on the Application of Science and Technology to Development.

Some 25 Canadian and American scientists took part in the seminar. Their view was that the major aspect of the "brain drain" problem was the feeling of isolation from the international scientific community experienced by many scientists in the developing nations.

To overcome this, the Advisory Committee proposed to the Seminar that associate scholarships be given to scientists from developing countries by US and Canadian universities. These, which would run for two to three years, would allow scientists to spend up to three months a year in either Canada or the United States provided that they returned to their own countries to continue their work for the remainder of the year.

Another scheme put forward was for joint research projects between scientists in developed countries and those in underdeveloped ones. Scientists would remain in their respective states but would pool their knowledge, discuss their research and publish their results jointly.

Road Safety Corner

- 1) Keep your headlight adjusted so that the dip beams will fall below the level of an oncoming driver's eye.
- 2) If for any reason you park your vehicle on the road at night, switch on your parking lights. Make it a point to carry always with you the internationally approved "Red Triangle" with reflectors which you can place 20 feet in front and 20 feet to the rear of your vehicle in case your lights are out of order. Failing this, inform the nearest Police Station so that adequate action may be taken to avoid accidents.
- 3) Pay particular attention to pedestrians especially in poor lighted areas. It is difficult to spot a pedestrian when he wears dark clothing.
- 4) Check the beam of your headlights and your dipping system.
- 5) Check your electric traffic indicators.
